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Add some bite to Bruce's canine fund-raiser

HOW many people would give up the prospect of dozens of expensive gifts to celebrate a milestone birthday to rather help others in need? The compassionate Bruce Wilson is one such man.

"Being involved in animal rescue is something I am passionate about. I have been talking to others about ways to make more of an impact with the work we do," said Bruce.

Bruce will turn the big 'five-oh' on Friday, 12 October and, instead of the age-old tradition of cake and gifts, he hopes to donate enough money to spay and neuter at least 50 dogs. As with most good ideas, said Bruce, this one also belonged to his wife, Chantalle.

The rescue rate per sterilisation is about R800. Bruce hopes to raise at least R40 000 for the event, and hopes to exceed it.

The animal lover opened his home as a depot for CROW, he is actively involved with Husky Rescue KZN and has been taking in unwanted parrots for the last 10 years, re-homing them where possible.

His house is called home by more than just his family, it includes one hamster, a rabbit, four dogs, and 10 parrots.

"The numbers are actually quite low, compared to what it normally is," laughed Bruce. His full-time job is rescue work.

"It's all voluntary and thanks to my wonderful wife, I get to be Mr Mom and do the rescue work that I love."

While he has an abundance of happy stories to share, he said the work he does was not all rainbows and sunshine.

"There are a lot of days when you want to give it up," he confessed. "But then you have days that the rescue cases work out really well and those are the ones that keep you going."

The funds raised will be split among the organisations he has partnered with for the campaign, which includes SCARR (Shongweni Community Animal Rehab and Rehoming), Lost Souls Animal Rescue, KZN Valley Dogs and Edu-Paw and Paw Prints.

"This drive is a preventative measure and the rescue centres are battling at the moment with funding, so every cent they can save by not having to sterilise a litter of puppies is money that can go into something else," he said.

While he may not be receiving any birthday gifts, he suspects his wife may have a trick or two up her sleeve to celebrate the big day.

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Sarnia water crisis continues

DESPITE a meeting arranged to address the water issues in the Sarnia area, residents said the situation has worsened and their complaints have fallen on deaf ears.

Residents in and around Sarnia have been experiencing ongoing water cuts due to a number of burst pipes for more than two months now and no solution has been proposed.

"Almost two weeks after the meeting, which was addressed by the engineers, there are still no tankers which we requested and there have been more than six burst pipes since," said Glen Park Neighbourhood Watch PR, Sharman Collins.

During the heated meeting, where residents raised their issues and demanded for the top management to come and address them, the Sarnia community was assured it would be given all the answers in three months.

'We have been told that if we received high water bills we have to pay them and then take it up with the water department, what a joke," said an irate Collins.

The residents said they certainly have no confidence in any further meetings.

"It is clear that they are not prepared to help us in any way. All the broken pipes and rubble have also not been removed off peoples' verges for months despite ongoing requests," explained Collins.

More burst pipes

Birches Pre-Primary School principal, Scilla Edmonds, said, the last time the school reported a burst pipe, it got worse.

'We waited six hours for the phone to be answered. We arrived at school at 6am and found water pouring down the road. We got through at 1pm and got someone to come and look that day at 2pm. The gushing water was finally sorted late in the afternoon, and days later, they returned to repair the road.

"The meeting revealed how bad the

situation is and the complaints made were valid. The water was off and on last week and there was no water again on Monday until midday.'

With two grandparents days being held this week, Edmonds asked how do they entertain guests when they needed buckets of water to flush toilets.

"Sarnia has their own stories to tell. Thank goodness there was rain this weekend so our tanks are replenished for a while," she said.

Brauteseth, who organised the meeting, said many issues were raised from frustrated residents and all the problems will be reported to the heads of department asking them to address these urgent issues.

"I will continue to drive this matter with the department and will have a report back meeting in three months. The water department is currently installing PRV (pressure reducing values) in various areas which is the first step to address the water problems.

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New Germany car guards to be monitored

CAR guards working in New Germany will now be monitored and their details recorded to reduce crime and make this job professional.

Pinetown SAPS communications officer, W/O Muzi Maphumulo, said there have been many instances where car guards have been linked to crimes such as remote jamming and hijacking.

'The car guards' job is to look after cars and the properties they work in which is the reason we have started this initiative so that someone can account for that area should anything

Maphumulo said the car guards operating in the areas such as Chelsea, Qashana Khuzwayo (Shepstone) and Escom Road will be monitored by police and the CPF.

"All their details will be recorded and we will regulate which post belongs to who. We want them to work together with us and report any suspicious activity. They will also be given a card with all their details and a number which the community can use to report them if they are doing something illegal. The community will also have a right to ask for their cards and check their credentials.

Pinetown CPF chairman, Tony da Canha, said this initiative is not only for the New Germany area as it will be rolled out to other areas, the next one being Pinetown.

"We have spoken to the car guards and told them if they continue working here, they need to be decent and clean. The car guards should not demand money. We are also trying to get sponsorship so we can get them proper uniforms," Da Canha said.

Maphumulo added that motorists still have a responsibility to physically check that their vehicle doors are locked.

Car guards need designated areas

One of the car guards, Billy Ntombela said he resorted to being a car guard after dropping out of school because of drugs.

He said he always wanted to get into the music business, but due to his drug abuse, he messed up and is now a car guard.

"I might have gotten into drugs because of peer pressure, but I do not blame anyone for how I have turned out as I could have chosen not to smoke," he said.

Ntombela said he cannot get a proper job and is working on trying to change his life as he does not take drugs anymore. On a bad day, Ntombela said he makes about R170, but on a good day, he gets more than R300.

"I have been trying to save money to continue my dream of making music. I am a musician by nature and I can write any kind of music, I am not limited to any specific genre."

He said not all car guards are drug addicts, but they have all been painted with the same brush as some smoke in full view of the passers-by.

The challenges the car guards complained mostly about is that they do not have designated areas. "We hope that this initiative will formalise our positions and areas so we can all work together peacefully," said Ntombela.

IF cars could speak, this 1959 Rover P4 100 would have a plethora of adventures to share around a camp fire.

In 1959, Betty Staniland (nee Tapson) of Kloof was in her 20s and made the bold decision to pack up and move to England for good.

Her family, which owned the Hawthorne Hotel in Durban, were quite wealthy and her loving parents said that if she stayed, they would purchase her a brand new car.

With this promise, she promptly took a walk down Smith Street in Durban and walked into the most expensive car dealership. In those days this was not Mercedes Bens or Jaguar, but Rover.

"In the 40s, 50s, 60s and 70s Rovers were the cars for the elite. The Queen had one,

Margaret Thatcher had a fleet and so did Princess Grace of Monaco. These were expensive cars," said engineer and car enthusiast, John Booth.

Betty walked around the store, pointed at the P4 100 and asked the salesman if she could have it.

The salesman thought she was joking around and was in two minds about kicking her out of the store until she declared she would pay for it, cash.

The following year she was married and the 1959 Rover P4 100 became her wedding car. Her parents shipped it overseas where her and her husband used it to tour through Europe while staying in luxurious hotels.

It has made its way across Europe including Venice, Austria, Germany, Switzerland and France.

The car was then shipped back to Durban after its

European adventures.

The little engine that could have done approximately 55 000 miles or 88 000km since it left the showroom floor all those years ago is arguably better travelled then many Durbanites.

Betty, now 87, took wonderful care of the car and only parted ways with it a few years ago. She sold it to a man in Howick and it was later snapped up by John Booth.

"At the time I did not know of the car's history. I did it up and contacted Betty and took it for her to see. She was overwhelmed and just hugged the car for a good few minutes," said an elated John.

"Cars had meaning back then. Today you can never determine wealth by what car a person drives. Back then it was different and a real status symbol," he said.

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Possible end for Wyebank eyesore

FRUSTRATED and irate residents, who are affected by the incomplete construction along Wyebank Road, met with the *Highway Mail* to address their multiple safety concerns.

The Western Aqueduct Project was awarded to Esor Construction,

by the eThekwini Municipality, in 2014

The project was programmed to take three years to complete and its original completion date was 28 April 2017.

It has been more than a year since the expected completion date and residents are demanding answers and for action to be taken.

Residents speak out:

Pat Pather (Wyebank Road)

Turning from Sea View Road onto Wyebank Road is so difficult and one day there is going to be a serious accident. When it rains the potholes are ridiculous.

The road closure of the one section of Wyebank Road has been going on for more than five months and the contract has been ongoing for more than four years. Dust and dirt is a continuous issue. Pipes have been dug up and they're still leaking and haven't been repaired.

The biggest danger here is for the pedestrians as they have no choice but to walk on the road. People swear, shout and hoot at them but they are fully exposed and must walk across the rubble.

Venessa Pillay (Rosedale Road)

They need to complete this project and they need to ensure the safety of the residents in the road. Aside from the condition and the unsightly mess, I am so fed up.

Gail Koekemoer (Sea View Road)

It is so unsafe. If there is a crash on the freeway this road is backlogged with traffic. It can be virtually impossible for us to leave and, when there isn't traffic, everyone is speeding. They have left this looking as it is - a mess!

Esor Construction's CEO, Wessel van Zyl, explains:

The Project has suffered many delays for various reasons such as business forum stoppages, taxi association stoppages, work force strikes, existing services needing to be relocated, inclement weather

As a result of these delays, the project period was extended and the current completion date is February 2019.

As a result of this liquidity crisis, the project has been further delayed.

Over the past 10 months, Esor has been grappling with extreme cash flow problems which, on 13 August 2018, culminated in Esor Construction entering into business rescue. As a result of this liquidity crisis, the project has been further delayed.

Through the business rescue process, Esor has engaged with the guarantors of the project to unlock post commencement funding which will see improved productions on site and pull back the anticipated completion date.

This plan of action is expected to be implemented in the next two weeks and will see a large roads contractor engaged for the completion of the roadworks.

eThekwini Municipality's deputy head of communications. Mandla Nsele, responds:

eThekwini Municipality awarded four contracts to Esor through normal supply chain management procurement process.

Esor has delayed the contracts for over two years as they could not adhere to any of the construction programmes set by themselves and, as a result of quality control issues and Esor's own stressed financial situation, sub-contractors withdrew from site as they were not paid and there was a shortage of construction materials.

This has impacted negatively

on the western and northern aqueducts. Several communities in the north and Pinetown south areas have been waiting for the completion of the projects to improve the water supply in their areas

Now this will be delayed. As per General Condition of Contract, the municipality holds five to 10 per cent (depending on contract value) in cash in lieu of retention, with five per cent released to the contractor once they have completed construction.

The remaining five percent is

released at the end of the one year defects liability period.

Esor tendered and was awarded four aqueduct contracts under these retention conditions of the contract.

The municipality is fully compliant with the payment terms and legislation as per the Municipal Finance Management Act.

We have had various meetings and discussions with Esor in a bid to help complete this project, however, municipal officials are bound to work within the policies.

IN May, my neighbour (in Kloof) approached me with his assertion that our boundary fence was incorrectly sited and needed to be moved some four metres into my garden!

He assured my wife and I that professionals had verified his beacon claim and proceeded to not only resite the boundary - slicing off a huge swathe of my property - but also chopped down my mature fruit and tibouchina trees together with all shrubbery within the claimed territory which had previously provided my cottage with

privacy. He then proceeded to swiftly construct an overbearing 2.5 storey structure towering over my modest cottage in such a way, destroying all privacy, and seriously devalue my property.

A friendly land surveyor sympathised with my plight and undertook a professional survey with astounding results; the neighbour's land claim was proved to be utterly false!

He was not only obliged to put the boundary fence back where it was originally sited, but to also demolish half of his building to comply with the building-line bylaws.

Success? Not really as fully grown trees (now needed more than ever) take decades to grow and the neighbour, now overtly hostile (amazingly) because his brazen subterfuge cost him dearly, sees no reason or responsibility to rehabilitate my devastated area.

However, I've just learned from the Architectural Authority that I - and other affected neighbours - should have been consulted prior to construction of this enormous structure.

No consultation took place and no consent was given.

The structure now awaits just its roof - is it too late for architects and developers to be forced to abide by the rules - or are they now just 'optional guidelines'?

So please be warned: the municipality, as things stand, sees no reason to insist that builders or developers provide proof of beacons or boundaries. Do make sure you know for certain where yours are!



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

What lurks in your bed?

THERE'S nothing better than climbing into a warm bed at the end of a long day and laying your weary head on a plumped up pillow or two ... but if you knew what else was sharing your pillow and mattress, you might be less keen to get cosy and up close to them.

Unless your pillow and mattress are encased in special protectors, they will build up a collection of dirt, grime and bugs over time. Over a period of around two years, an unprotected pillow could gain as much as half a kilo of this muck!

So, are you brave enough to know what you're pressing your face into each night?

⊃Dust mites are microscopic bugs that share your home,

living in vast colonies in your couches, curtains, carpets and. yes ... your mattress and pillows. Each night, you're breathing in mites - living and dead - and their faeces, which is a major cause of asthma, eczema and rhinitis. Research shows a good 10 per cent of a two-year-old pillow's weight is made up of this allergy-inducing grossness.

>Where there are dust mites, there are bound to be masses of your own dead skin cells and

dander from your pets too, a dust mite's favourite meal.

⇒To dead skin cells, add sweat. Every night, the average adult loses up to half a litre of fluid through sweating and the inevitable dribbling, part of which is soaked up by your

⇒All that night-time drooling and sweating creates an ideal environment for mildew and mould spores, exacerbating symptoms in allergy sufferers.



Skin and hair oils, greasy body products, residue from hair products, make-up... all this also works its way into an unprotected pillow, aggravating skin conditions and leaving pillows stained and unhygienic.







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How do you solve the problem?

Don't make the bed in the morning because mites like the warmth, so if you pull the sheets back it creates a hostile, cold environment for mites.

Wash your pillow and then tumble dry it to fluff it up, the heat from the dryer kills them.

You can even pop the pillow in the freezer to kill the mites - if you have space.

You should avoid drying clothes on radiators because the moisture makes your home more friendly to mites.

Keep the house slightly cooler and vacuum dust up. Get a really good vacuum cleaner that will get in all the nooks and crannys. The cleaner you keep your house the less dust there will be so the less there will be for the mites to eat.

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Hyundai's success startles

'...it now successfully competes on quality and specification level'

IN the two decades that Hyundai cars have been available in South Africa the Korean carmaker hasn't put a foot wrong. There were some early legal issues, with the private importer who initially introduced the brand being accused of tax evasion early in the new millennium, but the products' quality shone through loud and clear.

After Hyundai Automotive SA arrived a few years later the company for more than a decade refused to release sales figures through the National Association of Automobile Manufacturers of South Africa (NAAMSA) but anybody with half an eye open could see how the number of the Korean cars on SA's roads was escalating. About three years ago Hyundai relented and started

reporting sale figures, and the results confirmed that the brand had become a major player in SA. A glance at the returns for the first eight months of this year shows that in terms of passenger car sales Hyundai is the third best seller nationally, with 16,940 new cars leaving showrooms.

Volkswagen tops the log with 34,084 new cars sold and Toyota lies second with 32,576. Behind Hyundai is Ford with 12,168, and Renault closes off the top five with 11,415. Mercedes-Benz, BMW, Kia, Nissan and Mazda are all in the seven and eight thousands, and the remaining 15 listed importers and manufacturers share 29,490 between them.

That Hyundai, a car manufacturer that only ventured into the automotive business in 1967 and first arrived in South Africa less than twenty years ago can have achieved so much in such a short time is astonishing. It's also important to note that while the marque at first relied on cutthroat pricing as its biggest marketing tool, it now successfully competes on quality and specification level more than anything else.

A choice of seven Tucsons

Hyundai's Tucson and Creta softroaders are the company's third and fourth best-selling models after the Grand i10 and i20, and both recently received facelifts with new body detailing, dashboards and transmissions.

Two new derivatives were also introduced in the Tucson range, as were a seven-speed dual-clutch transmission and an eight-speed auto gearbox. The full LED headlights and taillights, uplifted front bumper, revised skid plate,

new exhaust tailpipes and new front grille are the most visible external changes.

There are now seven Tucson derivatives in three trim levels using three engines - two-litre petrol and diesel units with the auto transmission, and a 1.6 litre TGDI Elite with the DCT. Pricing ranges between R399,900 and R569,900.

The smaller and more affordable Creta has proved very popular in SA, selling more than 8,000 since its 2017 launch. The three model lineup remains unchanged, with all bearing the Executive trim title.

The car comes with a 90kW 1.6-litre naturally-aspirated petrol engine mated to a six-speed manual transmission, the same engine with a six-speed auto gearbox, and a 1.6-litre 94kW turbodiesel also with the six-speed auto box. Pricing ranges from

R339,900 for the 1.6 Executive manual to R399,900 for the 1.6 Executive turbodiesel auto.

Both Hyundai's soft roaders are beautifully put together and extremely well equipped. Neither is available in four-wheel-drive, but both are very dirt-road capable, which is about as much as most buyers are ever going to ask of a crossover SUV. I personally find the Creta more appealing than the Tucson, but you may not agree. If you're looking for a high-quality well-equipped crossover SUV it would be worth your while to take a close look at both.

All models come with five-year/90,000km service plans, five-year/150,000km warranties plus additional two-year/50,000km drivetrain warranties. Roadside assistance for five years or 150,000km is part of the Hyundai



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Range Rover Velar cuts a sleek figure

IT would be fair to say that the Range Rover Velar has caused more of a frenzy for Land Rover than when the Indian owned British manufacturer introduced the Evoque in 2011.

Named after the original 1969 Range Rover concept with the moniker being derived from the Latin word velaris meaning veil, the aluminium platform underpinned Velar has not only been a styling revolution for the brand, but also a forerunner in the tech department with a multitude of gadgets enclosed in a futuristic array of digital and touchscreen

displays that looks both premium and modern.

Billed as the sportiest Range Rover within the local line-up to date, the Velar cuts a sleek figure with its black honeycomb grille, long bonnet and angular LED headlights, with a side profile that it distinctively Range Rover and a rounded rear facia that its almost boot-like and features wraparound LED light clusters, integrated dual exhausts and a prominent black diffuser.

The Velar's biggest standout is its interior, which is as plush and luxurious in typical Range Rover fashion as it is loaded with equipment.



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Taking centre stage is the Touch Pro Duo system, which consists out of a 10inch touchscreen display that controls the infotainment features, while the lower display has the same dimension and houses the functions for the climate control, driving modes, Terrain Response 2 off-road system and seat settings

Compared to the somewhat impractical but classy looking white leather, the Union Jack patterns on the ventilated seats, chunky but soft-touch plastics, piano key black and aluminium inserts, the touchscreen was a bit fiddly to use.

This being the HSE, the level of tech is about as extensive as you could imagine with Adaptive Cruise Control, Autonomous Emergency Braking, Lane Departure Warning, quadzone climate control, the excellent 23-speaker Meridian sound system, two eight-inch rear screens with wireless headphones, a USB input and HDMI jack, surround view camera system and Lane Keep Assist being only a smidge of what is on offer.

The Velar's lowered roofline failed to intrude on head or legroom with the panoramic roof contributing in lending an airy feel, while the boot can swallow 671-litres of luggage or up to 1,731-litres when dropping the rear seats.

The 3.0-litre supercharged V6 in the P380 has 280kW/450Nm on tap, the amount of twist lashes the Velar with immediate effect when you push the thrust lever into the floor. The ZFsourced eight-speed automatic gearbox is as seamless in its everyday Drive mode as it is instant when you put it into Sport mode which can also be used with the aluminium gear shift paddles fixed to that grippy leather steering wheel.

Fun tanked

The P380's biggest downfall, apart from the R1,409,491 asking price, is the comparatively tiny 63-litre fuel tank which limits both range and the overall enjoy factor associated with that engine.

Left predominantly in Comfort mode throughout its week stay, the P380 returned a best of 11.7-litres/100km, well out of reach of the optimistic 9.4-litres/100km claim.

The P380 leaves no stone unturned regardless if you are on or off-road, but with its relatively more frugal powertrain, the D300 still rates



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SA new vehicle sales take a knock

SOUTH Africa's new vehicle market recorded its first decline in August since February, with the National Association of Automobile Manufacturers of South Africa (NAAMSA) recording a 2.5 percent drop from last year's 49,198 units to 47,964 this year. Declines also hampered both the Australian and US markets, while the United Kingdom registered a significant

improvement of 23.1 percent, helped by an eight percent spike in the sales of electric and plug-in hybrid vehicles.

The Nissan NP200 (pictured) is rated fifth among local top sellers and is still South Africa's favourite half ton bakkie.



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Hit the mark with new CR450R



THE ability to punch out of the gate first and build blistering lap times is what the CRF450R has been all about for the last two years, and performance rises yet again for 2019.

Honda Racing Corporation has extracted considerably more power and torque from the engine by fine-tuning the cylinder head and valve-gear without sacrificing low-rpm tractability.

Three-mode HRC Launch Control is an addition, helping novice or expert riders alike to hit the mark from the starting gate every time. A shift-sensor enables the use of specific ignition maps for each gear, and PGM-FI fuel injection system has been optimised to inject twice per cycle.

The oil pump capacity has been uprated, and the clutch lifter and pressure plate redesigned. Power has thus been improved by 2.4 hp at 9,500rpm and torque by 2Nm at 7,500 without adversely affecting low-down performance:

The 2019 model engine's power and torque curves are a considerable improvement on those of the previous design from 3,000 rpm upwards, and the over-rev capability between turns has also been enhanced.

The aluminium twin-spar frame is essentially unchanged but has been made slightly lighter, as has the swingarm, while a new front brake caliper also shaves vital grams off the compact package.

The 49mm Showa upside-down forks and rear shock absorber have also been breathed upon, and the Renthal racing tapered handlebars now offer more foreand-aft adjustment.
